From the Pastor's Screen

DECONSTRUCTION

"Rob Bell is going off the deep end!" the Elder said.

I was sitting in our Sunday morning adult bible study. There were six of us around the table in an Evangelical church, and somehow the conversation had turned to a new book by Rob Bell called, "Love Wins: A Book about Heaven, Hell, and the Fate of Every Person Who Ever Lived." I was startled by the Elder's words, and I silently responded from a place deep inside. "If Rob Bell is going off the deep end, I'm going, too."

In his book, Bell states, "Millions of Christians have struggled with how to reconcile God's love and God's judgment ... What if the story of heaven and hell we have been taught is not, in fact, what the Bible teaches? What if what Jesus meant by heaven, hell, and salvation are very different from how we have come to understand them?" After reading this quote from the book's jacket, I was intrigued. My process of deconstruction had begun.

Deconstruction is the critical analysis of philosophy, theology, or conceptual systems. According to author Keith Giles, our Christian faith is usually built around concepts believed to be truth, such as scripture, the church, hell and judgment, and the approaching end times. As children we were taught to accept religious ideas about ourselves, the world, and God. As adults, the church often encourages us to cling to those beliefs, even when life unfolds in opposition to them. We find ourselves

in cognitive dissonance when our beliefs don't line up with our experiences.

When that happens, we are faced with a choice: Cling ferociously to our beliefs OR examine them to see if they are ... well, believable. It's difficult work, and it can be frightening because we build our lives around our faith. Our deep beliefs provide structure to our world.

Imagine a house of cards. In the bottom layer of cards are those basic beliefs about the afterlife; we believe that only Christians go to heaven. Then we meet a beautiful soul who is agnostic, or Buddhist, or Muslim, and our belief is challenged. Releasing those foundational beliefs will cause the entire house of cards to collapse. We no longer know what is true, and we don't know what to believe. My Fundamental Christian friends call this the "slippery slope," and they avoid it at all costs.

Let's not avoid it. Let's pursue it.

The United Church of Christ was formed by faithful people who asked difficult questions like "who is harmed by this belief?" We don't tell people what to believe. Instead, we encourage each other to stay open and curious. If we continue to believe the same way for decades, we're not growing -- we're not asking the deep spiritual questions that emerge from authentic living.

Questioning is scary. Deconstruction is like riding Niagara Falls in a barrel. It's a scary, wild ride, and we simply don't know where we'll end up. Only God knows -- and God promises to meet us there. Once we've gone "down the slippery slope" and "off the deep end," we find the One who never leaves us nor forsakes us, waiting patiently.

TUESDAY, MARCH 28 AT 5 PM




American Red Cross Shelter
