From the Pastor's Screen

HOPE CABIN

Following an especially stressful week, my husband Keith and I decided to rent a cabin in Hocking Hills, Ohio, in the foothills of the Appalachians. We usually spend some time online researching the area and the rental homes before we travel. This time, we didn't. Keith found a cabin and I booked it. We threw our overnight bags in the truck and took off.

We arrived at Hope Cabin with high hopes – which quickly evaporated.

The first issue was the bedding. I couldn't find any. No sheets, no towels. The rental details (which we had not read) stated: "Please bring your own bedding and towels." We didn't.

The second problem was our neighbors living in the wall: mice. They had a wonderful time scratching every night.

Then we met "wood roaches" (not to be confused with their cousins, the cockroaches). These big bugs love wood, not food or clothing or people ... or so they say.

Finally, after driving a long distance to the nearest town so we could buy the cheapest bedding we could find, we settled in for the night – on the worst mattress we've ever slept on. We nearly sank to the floor. By sunrise Keith and I were sore and cranky, and we decided to pack up and leave.

Then I made some coffee, and we carried our mugs outside to the porch. The trees rose gracefully, a gentle breeze blew, and it was quiet. Still.

Peaceful. We held our warm mugs and welcomed the morning. I imagined waking up in a hotel with the noise of traffic and people, surrounded by concrete and bright lights – and we decided to stay. We stayed with the mice and the bugs and the terrible mattresses and the cheap sheets. We stayed with the trees and the silence and the calm.

Someone once said, "Where your attention goes, your energy flows." When our attention was focused on all the problems at Hope Cabin, we were unable to see the beauty. We missed the peace we craved. We lost hope.

We all know that cabin life comes with all sorts of neighbors, and most of them are unwelcome. I'm not fond of big bugs, and I certainly don't like sharing my house with mice. When all our attention was on those small problems, we couldn't see the big picture. We almost missed the beauty right in front of us.

Isn't that what church is like? Small problems clamor for our attention. Someone sat in "my" pew. So-and-so said such-and-such. The pastor walked by and didn't even say hello ... Where's the live music? Where's the choir?

Let's pause for a moment and consider what's good. Church is our safe space. It grounds us. It welcomes us, and it challenges us. Church invites us to reorient our souls in the way of Jesus so that when we go back to the "real" world, we are refreshed.

We don't need mice, wood roaches, or lumpy mattresses -- we have enough distractions of our own. Let's create opportunities to feel peaceful and calm. Let's focus on the good.

BEING GOOD SAMARITANS

In September our Samaritan Fund received 37 requests for assistance. We had 15 requests for help with rent; seven payments were issued. We had 17 requests for help with Consumers bills; nine payments were issued. We had 5 requests for water bill assistance; four payments were issued. Requests for help with motel stays and gas money were referred to other agencies. Thirteen people received emergency food. Showers were used 36 times last month.

Food Pantry & Baby Sprinkle

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Our Food Pantry & Baby Sprinkle was held on September 15. We provided 1800 pounds of food and served 148 individuals, representing 371 family members. Baby Sprinkles and Kids' Closet provide clothing for infants and children up to size 8, baby items, and diapers. Last month 31 families received items; 52 children were served. The next Food Pantry and Baby Sprinkle will be October 20 from 10 AM to 12 noon.







All Saints Day Slideshow
