From the Pastor's Screen

ADAPTATION

At the beginning of each year, I ask God for direction as I choose an intention for the days to come. This year our intention is "adapt." Nature teaches us all about adaptation. Animals do it all the time to survive as conditions around them change.

The Atlantic pygmy octopus can change its appearance when predators are nearby; it takes on the form and color of a rock. A leaftailed gecko changes its appearance to (you guessed it) a leaf. A wood frog can survive the most brutal weather as far north as Alaska by allowing 60 percent of its body to freeze. In the spring, it thaws.

Animals know how to survive. What about churches?

If we are willing to adapt, we can continue to worship and serve together far into the future. The question is, what does adaptation look like?

- It looks like a newsletter that is the joint effort of all.
- It looks like differences in our worship, music, staff, and offices.
- It looks like making space in our sanctuary for another church's treasured items.
- It looks like the closing of some activities and missions in order to support new, combined efforts.
- It looks like frank and open conversations where everyone participates.
- It looks like a blended family -- because that's what we will be.

Let's choose to adapt. Let's look for times and places where we can practice adaptation -- letting go of something good to make room for something better. When we're feeling uncomfortable, just remember the wood frog, and hold in your heart the feeling of a warm spring breeze. We will thaw. We will adapt. We will survive. We will thrive!




I will give them one heart and put a new spirit within them;





Be the Blessing


SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE

What's in a Name?

WAYS TO PARTNER

Names matter. Parents often struggle to choose the "right" name for their child. I recently met a young boy named Wilde. And, well, he is a little wild! He's growing into his name.

For many months we've been wondering what it might look like to partner with another church in joint witness ministry. Since we are not merging together, we will remain St. John's UCC, while our partner church will remain Westminster Presbyterian Church. I have asked the council to consider naming our physical location at 801 S. Mechanic Street "Partnership Place" as a way to include WPC. When I presented this idea to the church council, some members liked the name and others did not. Just as parents need time to consider their child's name, we are considering what a new name might mean.

My reasons for naming our building Partnership Place are threefold:

- It is a welcoming and inclusive name for everyone who uses our building, including those who rent space, and it provides a warm welcome to Westminster Presbyterian Church.
- It shows solidarity with our neighborhood, Partnership Park.
- It differentiates us from St. John's Catholic Church.

Why is this important? Why can't we just stay the same? Many of you remember the "good old days" when the church was filled with people. When a church is growing, it is moving up the bell curve (see next page) and its strength is found in vision and relationships.


WHAT'S IN A NAME (CONTINUED)

At the top of the graph, we reach our peak and begin to mature. We focus less on vision and relationships, and more on programs and maintenance. If we continue down the bell curve, we end with death -- the closing of St. John's UCC.

That doesn't have to happen. If we act now to re-define, re-develop, and become re-born, we can move away from maintenance and move toward vision and relationships again. We can begin to grow. Staying the course is not an option. We must adapt.

After a candid conversation with one of our members, I understand that I cannot make this choice for you. I cannot pick a name or a course of action. This church consists of members who have grown up here and have remained faithful for far longer than my short tenure. If we make any changes, it's up to you -- you choose. Maybe a new name is unnecessary ... maybe there are other methods that will help us change our trajectory. At our upcoming congregational meeting, many voices will share their heartfelt opinions. It is my hope that all of us can respectfully join into this conversation.

Please prayerfully consider our future actions as we welcome
Westminster Presbyterian in joint witness ministry. Just as parents
consider carefully the name of a new child and how they will provide
for it, we envision the re-birth of St. John's UCC as part of a
combined ministry. It's my prayer, whether we adopt the name
"Partnership Place" or not, that we will live into the spirit of that
name long into the future.
