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From the Pastor's Screen

Last week when Darryl Hackworth asked me to explain Ash Wednesday, I realized I knew very little about the day and how it began. Why is the day important to Christians?

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent and it is always 46 days before Easter. Lent is traditionally a season of penance which prepares us for the new life offered by the Risen Christ. Our Ash Wednesday tradition originated in the 11th century as a symbol of repentance. The Imposition of Ashes comes from the Old Testament description of deep grief and sorrow, where penitents sat in "sackcloth and ashes."

Ash Wednesday is also a day of fasting. Christians may abstain from eating meat, and for many Christians a form of fasting continues throughout the season of Lent.

According to journalist Ashley Ross, the Imposition of Ashes in the sign of a cross was not practiced by all forms of Christianity and only became popular in the United States around 1970. It is a multi-sensory, organic way to embody faith in our everyday lives, as well as providing an outward sign of faith.

The ashes come from the palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday. I save unused palms and burn them in a metal bowl in my backyard to create the ashes. When a few drops of oil are added, the ashes become spreadable and will remain on a person's forehead in the visible sign of the cross.

I can recall riding home on the school bus one Ash Wednesday afternoon with my cross-shaped ashes visible on my forehead. I explained to the public-school kids that yes, I knew my forehead had dirt on it. "But it's not dirt," I said. "Today is Ash Wednesday, and these are ashes." That was all I could say, because I really did not understand the connection of ashes to penance and mortality.

The meaning of the ashes comes from Genesis 3:19, in which God said, "By the sweat of your face you shall eat bread until you return to the ground, for out of it you were taken; you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Those words, spoken over us, are powerful: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Yes, we will all die. Yes, we all feel some regret. We feel these emotions when the ashes are placed upon our skin. Then, the overwhelming hope we find in Christ beckons us as we turn and look toward Easter.

In January, nine individuals received emergency food and 15 people took showers. The Samaritan Fund provided assistance for one eviction and one utility payment.


Contributed by Michele Wilson Our January Baby Sprinkle and Kids' Closet was held on January 19 and served 24 families, representing 48 children.
