RESILIENCE

Last fall Keith and I transplanted a hydrangea tree. It was one of my favorite flowers in our yard, and it needed to be moved. Although we dug carefully, it refused to release the soil. We used a truck to pull it out, which was traumatic for both me and the tree. We replanted it, watered it, and watched as every leaf dried up and fell off. It looked like death was imminent. Then the temperature plunged, and the snow fell.

I watched over that tree throughout the winter months. I knew it was hopeless, and yet ... I kept hoping. In March, when I trimmed the tree, I noticed a green ring inside the dead-looking branches. Sure enough, a few weeks later tiny nubs appeared on every branch. The tree was alive!

We knew it needed energy to unfurl its leaves, so we added root stimulator and fertilizer. The leaves are still tiny, but they are growing. Will the tree survive? Only time will tell, but the Spirit of Life is in her branches, and that same Spirit lives in you and in me.

Life today feels uncertain. Each day brings new trauma as our political, national, and world situation changes. For many of us, our health concerns and fears for loved ones fill our days with anxiety. Yet, when I see my little hydrangea tree, I feel hope.



How often do the Thought Partners meet?


Last year, they met almost monthly, leaving time to do work within and between congregations. After a brief break, they are meeting monthly (as needed) until they complete their work this year. This time they are moving forward with research and design on the recommendations the church received from Potentials, keeping in mind the creative wishes and concerns raised in the answers to the questions asked in our all - church meeting. Their function is not to make decisions, but to advise the Partnership Place Board, which meets less often.


What is the role of the Thought Partners?

The Thought Partners have served as a design team to bring together the Westminster and St. John's communities. Their role has been to help map leadership, fellowship, mission, and identity. Their role is not permanent; they will dissolve in the coming months, and the role will become the responsibility of the Partnership Board.

Is Partnership Place an entity?

Partnership Place is a way of framing the overall missions of the St.John's/Westminster union. The name captures the spirit of the faith community while also providing a way of communicating with the larger community about this entity and its work.







Is our church name Partnership Place?

At this stage, the church name has not changed they are still St. John's UCC & Westminster Presbyterian. In time, the leadership will need to consider how to better represent your joint ventures. For example, when two churches come together in this way, they often take a name such as "St. John's Westminster Union Church" or simply "Community Union Church" That said, the congregations may choose to call themselves "Partnership Place" as a way of capturing the larger identity, using an internal governance structure to maintain denominational affiliations. It would be worth holding a Town Hall to discuss these options.
